Rector's Report

It is often my practice to begin meetings of all sorts with a simple check-in. On a scale of 1-5, with 1 being wretched and 5 being marvelous, how are you? The question is always relative to the very moment, it is asking how one is in that very moment. Do they come to this meeting in pain or grief or unfocused excitement? I ask it for no other reason than in my experience humans don't check in with one another enough. So if no one has asked you today, I ask you. How are you on a scale of 1-5?

As you are taking the time to read this annual report, you are likely wondering, how is CCRP? I would give it a 4. The life and ministry continue, adapted, imperfectly, but with a whole heart and the presence of Jesus. The finances are good. The staff and volunteer leadership is amazing, continuing to play above our 'station.' Yet at the same time, if the number exists to articulate the difference between where I hoped we would be looking out from the end of 2019 and where we are now, it is beyond my mathematical skills to identify. Some intentions are 'way ahead of schedule' and others have dissolved in the winds of time like plans for trips that I didn't take and only recall because of bookmarks in my computer. We are where we are. We are doing our best to love Jesus and love our neighbor and do our part. I see your love and presence and commitment, whether you have been picking up new duties weekly, or have been keeping your distance (for whatever reason). Your prayerful attention and steadfastness in service and desire for a better world matters, and we see it and feel it. I want to highlight _ parts of the 2021 year together at Christ Church, Ridley Park.

- Welcoming Deacon Dennis: The ministry of the diaconate is one of loving service, of connecting the church to the needs of the world and the needs of the world to the work of the church. We are blessed to have the consistent caring servant leadership of Deacon Dennis with us.
- Outdoor Worship: The outdoor Easter vigil was an absolute delight. So to were many of the 'backyard' Eucharists last summer. And the response to our little prayer tree has been consistent, with a wide variety of neighbors stopping to use it to pray. I feel strongly that we have only just begun to use our outdoor property to meet the real spiritual needs of the neighborhood. Maybe you can daydream with me about what's next.
- Website and Streaming: A good website is as critical to a congregation as accessible, friendly and tidy doorways to a nave. It is our threshold, the place where continuing friends and members connect, and it is the gateway where the curious begin to figure out if this might be the place to help them find union with God and each other in Christ. This year we completed the upgrade of the website, and it is user friendly and true to CCRP. It integrates all of our news and virtual services into one easy to connect with 'location.' We have learned many things in our almost two years of being a hybrid worshiping congregation: the 'live' participation is not the same as the total participation several days later. Our streaming services, including Eucharists, special liturgies, and the Prayer during the Day, are made use of by locals, members, strangers, and friends of the parish, sometimes days after the broadcast. Which means that families can choose to worship together on their schedules, allow those with Sunday jobs to worship with us when they are available, and also offers a gift to young families negotiating the complexities of life and babies. It is a wise investment, and we are forever grateful to the leadership of Mackenzie Alexander and to the streaming volunteers who assist with nave services.

• Music Ministry: Slowly but surely, with the extra protection of good masking and hearty circulation, we have been able to restore singing and service music to our practice of worship. And oh it feels so good. I am not sure I had any idea how much my very body missed the chance to sing with other voices. Thank you to our choir for their flexibility throughout the year. As you know our dear friend Janet is not returning to the music ministry, and we have been enriched by the contributions of our guest music directors: Mary Eileen Johnston and Dr. Steven Neau. I hope you will keep the search process, which began with the new year, in your heart and prayers. Lastly, we did have a small service to lay to rest the remains of Michael Trinder, and we want you to know that someday when the world is free and easy, we will have the grand memorial service he envisioned.

One of the areas of pause is centered in the idea of collaboration. In the search process that was an important part of the vision for what was next. Collaboration is harder for me to manage when the collaborators are sometimes out of my line of vision. This is a fact of the best practices of the pandemic, but also a side effect of our having fallen into new habits of distance. I hope as we move into the next year we can find fresh ways to improve the two-way relationships, no matter the state of the pandemic, and that you will help the leadership know that you are willing to lend a hand and step in and help as safely as you can - move from the back row and into the front seats if you will - and help us know that you are ready to serve.

I want to thank the Vestry for their patient companionship through all of this time. I want to thank Ed Dougherty for his year as Rector's Warden. I am deeply grateful to the long-serving Altar Guild members who are letting go and passing along this critical weekly ministry. We lost several beloved friends this year to Jesus' loving arms, and we will always miss them. We also welcomed new friends and babies and sold more pumpkins than we ever imagined we could. The year had its beauty and its silly surprises and its laments. The year had us playing above our average, letting go of old ways we no longer need, and growing in our knowledge of who we are intended to be as those committed to Christ. I hope this new year brings us grace and peace and energy and hope. I pray this new year reshapes us into the children of God that Christ is leading us to become, striving together for dignity and duty to the common good. I hope we try new ways of being together.

Youth Ministry

In the beginning of 2021, when Youth Ministry was still meeting for formation via zoom, we wrapped up our nine session Success & Failure Discussion Series curriculum by the Virginia Theological Seminary before transitioning into the eight session Peace & Justice Discussion Series curriculum. We continued to meet online until April where we had our first in-person Youth Council meeting and Youth Group gathering for the first time since the on-set of the pandemic!

Servanthood remained a pillar of our lives together throughout the year. In February Christ Church Youth Ministry challenged St James Prospect Park and St. John the Evangelist Essington to a Canned Good Collection Competition. This challenge sparked a friendly competition in which we were challenged back from the neighboring Episcopal churches for a book drive faceoff in May. Letters of Love, where youth sent handwritten notes to homebound parishioners, circulated in the mail one more time for Easter blessing messages. Lastly, Youth Ministry focused it's time over the summer to local service opportunities including time at Ridley Park United Methodist Church Food Bank and joining the Diocese's Summer Mission in the City at The Church of the Crucifixion in South Philly. We also tried our hands at being chefs, cooking and preparing the main dish for Life Center in August.

Over the summer Youth Ministry used to opportunity to be outside and spend more time reconnecting in-person. The Weekday Unwind was introduced, meeting every other Thursday for unstructured time and ending in Evening Prayer. Youth would decide upon when to do with our unstructured time and we spent many gatherings running around outside and sharing what had been going on in our lives. We also had our fair-share of fun with a sleep-at-home Lock In, Chopped Family Cook-off with mystery ingredients deliver to youth households, and a team-building trip to Go Ape at Lums Pond.

Youth Council was "reorganized" to become a once a month gathering open to <u>all</u> youth and their families as opposed to a closed group. The monthly time together is spent sharing a meal, planning the months ahead, and ending in a group activity/reflection/or guest speaker. Mackenzie became involved in Diocesan Youth Ministry youth leader meetings and was part of the pilot team to become trained to bring the Dismantling Racism for Teens curriculum to the diocese of Pennsylvania. The two-day education event on racial healing took place in February with participation from CCRP youth and the programming will continue to be offered. Lastly, four youth were prepared for confirmation with guidance from Reverend Jane. Final projects were shared this fall in the Deppich Room. We are awaiting scheduling for the service of reception.

Youth ministry is looking forward to building routine and leaning back into our traditions and rituals in 2022. We will be kicking-off our next discussion series and looking to revive Lunch & Learns. If you have a life-skill, trade, or craft you are willing to teach to youth group, please reach out!

Mackenzie has kept in contact, checking in on our college students as they adjusted to a new academic year. Over Thanksgiving break some college students were able to gather and share a meal together.

Communications

Morning Prayer remained pre-recorded and edited in the beginning of the year, before the parish transitioned into meeting live for Morning Prayer on Zoom. All the while we were making use of our new streaming camera during the in-person Eucharist (which started off as one service). When it was safe, we made our way back to two in-person services, in which the 10:15am Eucharist will remain live streamed indefinitely. Our Tech Pit got set-up with a new audio system and a desktop computer to go along with the streaming camera. A Tech Team was also trained on live-streaming services and we would love to welcome more members to our team.

In the summer we transitioned onto a new website with the assistance from Membership Vision. The new website allows for much more flexibility and integrates our livestream, social media pages, email blasts, and newsletter. Our website has become the central online information hub, while our social media platforms (Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter) share more of a supporting role privy to their own niche.




Facebook

Outreach Committee

I was very fortunate to have been assigned as deacon to CCRP this past Spring. When Carol Pindar decided to step back as lead of the Outreach Committee, I saw this as an opportunity for me to exercise and grow into the diaconate order into which I was ordained. Carol has been a great help to me, providing records, back stories, and sharing experiences of many years at the helm. The transition was seamless.

Since then, we have continued on the same course, providing financial support to the Loaves and Fishes and Ridley Park UMC food pantries. This past Summer, Mackenzie brought a group of our youth to RP UMC to assist in carrying groceries to customers' cars.

For part of 2021 we also financially helped Meals on Wheels, and St Mary's Food Cupboard until both ceased operations. Gifts of Mary in Chester, run by Mother Teresa's Missionaries of Charities declined help this past Summer, so we sent those funds, and other donated items to Family Promise / IHN of Delaware County shelter in Brookhaven.

My first project after I arrived at CCRP was to distribute the items Rev. Jane received when she was installed as rector. About a half of the goods were given to Chester Eastside Ministries located at St Paul's Chester. Another 200 juice boxes were sent to Family Promise in Brookhaven, 200 to Ridley Park UMC Food Pantry, and 200 to St Mary's Chester.

CCRP continues supporting Life Center Shelter in Millbourne. Carole McManus, with the assistance of other parishioners continues to provide meals and personal items to the 30 some residents of the shelter. Pandemic rules have limited the scope of that of previous years. Carole will continue in this ministry in 2022.

In 2021, we continued providing Ditty Bags to the Philadelphia Seamans Institute. We had promised them 25 bags but filled 31. Items included hats, gloves, scarves, and personal items. PSI has had a long history of partnership with the Diocese of PA. Assembly of ditty bags were made by a group of 12 or so volunteers after a 10:15 service in November. It has been challenging to schedule group activities, but this one went very smoothly.

I am also very happy to report CCRP's solid support of the diocesan Deacon's Jean Drive. We provided 101 pairs, which were distributed along with 2,200 others from across the diocese by Project Home.

During 2021 we provided dozens of prayer shawls to Fair Acres and Aventura at Prospect nursing homes, knitted by caring parishioners.

This past Christmas we participated in two outreach projects: Ridley Township School's clothing drive for needy students, and Fair Acres Geriatric Center in Lima. We brought 54 coats along with gloves and hats to the school district. Our generosity to Fair Acres was great enough to provide gifts for a whole floor of residents at the facility.

In 2022, we will continue to weigh options of which ministries we should support. We plan to give preference to local ministries. I plan to meet with staff from Citi Team and Chester Eastside Ministries, both in Chester.

On a personal level, I meet with about a dozen local residents who need financial help, a ministry started by Rev. Judy Buck-Glenn. Support not including gift cards comes from the Deacon's Discretionary Account.

In 2022, I will be implementing some policies and controls to ensure gift cards, and bill paying help go to those who really it.

Finally, again I am very happy to serve at CCRP. The support I receive from staff and Parishioners makes my ministry a joy.

After many months, we were able to sing in church as soloists and later as a full choir, wearing masks to maintain safety.

Despite the trials of the pandemic we have fond memories of choir gatherings under the tree in the church garden, even in the rain, to sing together as an ensemble. And who can forget our virtual choir that sang for Easter 2020?

Sadly, late in 2021, Janet withdrew from her position as organist and choir director, to devote time to urgent family matters. We extend tremendous thanks to Janet for all that she has done to strengthen the music ministry and provide wonderful music to enhance our worship. We also thank Mary Eileen Johnston, who led the music for several weeks. We were then happy to welcome Dr. Steven Neau as our interim leader. Steve led us through the end of year (and will continue as we conduct an official search for the new Music Director).

Many thanks to our professional section leaders, Julie (soprano), Terrance (tenor), and Dan (bass), who have continued to help provide wonderful music for our live and streamed services. And a hearty welcome our new alto, Samantha. Many thanks to our volunteers who have sung so beautifully: Amy, Carole, Robert, and Enric.

We invite members of the congregation to consider joining the choir. We have a weekly rehearsal on Thursday evenings, as well as a warm-up session on Sundays before the 10:15 service.

Finance Committee

The finance committee met monthly on Zoom throughout 2021.

In January, we presented a \$530,689 balanced budget for Vestry approval that was then approved by the Parish at the annual meeting held on February 7, 2021. It included a plan to make monthly payments of \$3,000 on the Memorial Garden loan that had a balance of \$166,441 at the end of 2020.

We held a virtual meeting in March with our Merrill Lynch advisor to go over the investment plan and strategy for our funds. Finance felt we could add an additional \$1000 to our monthly loan payments.

Our Paycheck Protection Plan Loan (\$43,367) was forgiven, turning it into a grant. \$30,000 was then applied to the Memorial garden loan.

Deppich Scholarships totaling \$20,000 were awarded to 8 students.

We decided to defer the quarterly distributions from our investments in the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th quarters (\$12,424 each quarter) that would normally be operating income. We moved \$10,000 from investments to the Memorial Garden loan.

An annual audit was completed and reported to the Diocese in the fall. We started the budgeting process in November. Money counters returned in December. At this time, money will be counted twice a month.

End of year figures and the 2022 proposed budget will be presented at the annual meeting.

Formation

Our first promise of baptism is 'to continue in the apostles teaching, fellowship and the prayers'. Our first promise is to commit to learning the maps of this faith and then getting out on the road with them and following the paths with our lives. Formation is learning, it is trying and flubbing, it is creative expression, it is classic practices of daily prayer and regular community worship, it is friendships and relationships of caregiving. The ongoing pandemic era has dented and evolved our practices of formation, and will continue to do so in the years ahead.

Over the last year for adult formation we once again offered the Episcopal Handbook class. For Lent we joined virtually with our neighbors at Incarnation Holy Sacrament to share in the series 'Entering the Passion of Jesus'. It was lovely to follow with Dr. Jill Levine and to share that time with our deanery friends.

Every month we prepare and share the daily prayer offering of Prayer During the Day. Each month it is shaped to reflect the worldly and liturgical season so as to give a shape of prayer that is reliable, a weekly repetition so as to better learn the texts, and then changing monthly to keep us from zoning out. Most Mondays-Thursdays this habit is shared with the world on our facebook page (and you don't have to be a part of facebook to watch it - the link is on our website every time). Not only do we pray this together with local and worldwide friends, there is a daily teaching and sometimes some singing. PDD is certainly a formation effort that offers you peace, community, learning, and the embrace of the Spirit.

Each liturgical season we have given out dozens of reflection guides to aid your daily practices. We also prepared Holy Week 'mostly at home' bags and shared those with the local mailing list.

Safeguarding our youngest persons and balancing the demands of parenting in this pandemic has severely limited our options for the formation of our school age children. We tried the Holy Unplugged program this fall, a meal, prayer, and Godly Play learning for all ages. It did not connect with young families, but the older people who took part were truly blessed by the experience. Thanks to the marvelous Sharon Cotter for her ongoing work with this sacred gift. We also want to note the death of our dear friend and longtime leader in children's formation, Bill Whaley. In the new year we will be renovating the classrooms to make them cleaner, safer, and more flexible for the needs going forward. I hope you will lend your heart to this project.

We have promised to continue, and we will continue to be formed by Christ, to learn more and more the heart and feeling of becoming his people in the world.
